## **Suggestions and Expectations**

This curriculum unit can be used in a variety of ways. Each chapter of the novel study focuses on two or three chapters of *Mr. Stink* and is comprised of four different activities:

- a) Before You Read
- b) Vocabulary Building
- c) Comprehension Questions
- d) Language and Extension Activities

A **portfolio cover** (p.7) as well as a **Checklist** (p.6) are included so that students may track of their completed work.

Every activity need not be completed by all students.

### Links with the Common Core Standards (U.S.)

married to the model, Lara Stone. David has been diagnosed with bipolar disorder.







I smell so bad, so very bad, I smell both night and day. It's cause my soap's so doggone cheap, It keeps the girls away.




